


Reflect



Reflect on Your Teaching

A philosophy of teaching statement helps clarify and communicate your teaching goals, methods, and values, ensuring a coherent and supportive learning environment. It also evolves with experience, keeping your approach dynamic and demonstrating your commitment to student success.

- What are your primary goals as an educator?
- How do you believe students learn best?
- What teaching methods or strategies do you use, and why?
- How do you engage and inspire students?
- What successes and challenges have shaped your approach?

Don't Forget to Include

- Teaching honors and awards
- Teaching grants and Contracts (internal and external)






Organize

Organize Around Core Themes

Select the main components that will guide your philosophy statement. Using a structure like GRIDS can help with cohesion.

- **Goals:** Define your primary objectives for student learning.
- **Rationale:** Explain why you choose specific teaching methods or approaches.
- **Implementation:** Describe how you put your philosophy into practice.
- **Development:** Emphasize how your teaching supports student growth.
- **Success:** Show how you assess teaching effectiveness and student outcomes.





Draft

Draft an Outline

1. Introduction: Personal Teaching Beliefs and Goals

- Introduce your core beliefs about teaching and learning.
- Describe your overall goals as an educator at the University of Memphis, such as preparing students for their careers, fostering critical thinking, or promoting lifelong learning.

2. Rationale: Why You Teach the Way You Do

- Whenever possible, include examples from your teaching to illustrate your points.
- Consider asking a colleague or mentor for feedback to ensure your statement resonates with your professional goals and achievements.
