Construction Law



What is Construction Law?

Construction lawyers are those lawyers who represent clients in relation to a construction project. Construction lawyers might represent building owners, construction companies, contractors, subcontractors, or individual employees. Construction lawyers typically represent clients through the entire construction project: advising property purchases and land development, negotiating contracts, mediating disputes, and appearing in court, if necessary (Melton).

Construction law encompasses or intersects with many fields of law including contract law, employment law, commercial law, planning law, torts, worker's compensation, dispute resolution, and oil and gas law. For this reason, construction law cases are complex. Construction lawyers should have a broad understanding of all or most of these areas of law to be successful. Construction projects and companies often cross jurisdictional boundaries, so construction lawyers should be fluent in important statutes of their entire region (Gavin and O'Connor and Barr and Davis).

Construction law cases are often long-term projects, lasting months or years. Furthermore, construction lawyers often take on their clients on a long-term basis, handling the legal work for many different projects.
