What is intellectual property law?

- ♦ Intellectual property ("IP") law protects inventions and various forms of artistic and scientific expression.

 Intellectual property law has been developed through the enactment of statutes and through a body of case law.
- Intellectual property can be broken down into specialized areas: patent rights, copyrights, trademarks, unfair competition, and trade secrets.
 - o <u>Patent law</u> involves protecting an inventor's property rights. Under United States law, a patent is a right granted to the inventor of: (1) A process, machine, article of manufacture, or composition of matter; and (2) Is new, useful, and non-obvious. A patent is the right to exclude others from using a new technology.
 - o <u>Copyright law</u> concerns the rights of creators of works in the entertainment, publishing, and fine arts industries.
 - o Lawyers working in <u>trademarks and unfair competition</u> work with clients to choose trademarks, clear them for use, and register them.
 - o Lawyers who work on <u>trade secrets</u> advise clients about how to keep their industry secrets and litigate on their behalf when a trade secret has been improperly acquired.

Where do intellectual property lawyers work?

- Private law firms: Attorneys specializing in patent, trademark, and copyright law often work in the intellectual property department of large general practice law firms or in small to medium size boutique law firms.
- ◆ <u>Federal government</u>: IP lawyers may work in the Patent and Trademark office, a federal agency of the United States.
- ◆ In-house counsel: IP lawyers may work in a corporation's legal department as in-house counsel. Some example of companies that might staff in-house lawyers include pharmaceutical companies, medical device manufacturers (e.g., Medtronic), music record labels, or publishing houses.

What can I do as a law student to help me prepare for a practice in intellectual property law?

- ◆ The following courses would provide a student with substantive information about intellectual property law:
 - o Copyright
 - o Cyber law
 - o Patent law
 - o Sports law
- Participate in law review, a law journal, or legal writing competitions

- Clerk for a federal judge or do a judicial externship
- ♦ Work as a summer associate or law clerk for an IP law firm
- ◆ Join the IP section of the Memphis Bar Association or the American Bar Association

What skills or qualifications are most important for IP lawyers?

- Having a Bachelor's of Science
- ♦ Good oral and written communication skills
- Negotiation skills
- ♦ Interest in technology and innovation
- Able to work with people of diverse/international cultures
- An understanding of business and economics
- An awareness of social and consumer issues
