Workers' Compensation Law



What is Workers' Compensation?

Workers' compensation is a form of insurance that provides wage replacement and medical benefits to employees injured in the course of employment paid for in exchange of the employee's right to sue his or her employer. The United States Department of Labor oversees four federal workers' compensation programs including the Energy Workers Program, the Federal Employees' Compensation Program, and the Longshore and Harbor Workers' Compensation Program, and the Black Lung Benefits Program.

Workers' compensation programs are also administered by state governments and the private sector. Most workers' compensation claims are handled by administrative law judges.

Where Do Workers' Compensation Attorneys Work?

Corporate

In-house counsel for corporations deal with workers' compensation and other issues related to employment law. These lawyers defend businesses when their employees sue. Along with a human resources department, in-house corporate lawyers handle the paperwork and forms related to workers' compensation.

Large Firms

Large firms may supplement an existing in-house legal U.S. Department of Labor—Jobs department in a workers' compensation-related case.

Small and Mid-Size Firms

Prior to changes in the law, workers' compensation required bulk-work litigation in order to make a profit. In the 1990s and early 2002, sole practitioners and small firms could make a living based off of an exclusive workers' compensation practice. State law affects whether small practices can remain tenable in this field
